New Truck Entrance for Warehouse

New security will provide 24/7 accountability.

The Port of Morrow Warehouse will have a secure truck entry by November. Construction on the new entrance began in September.

Safety is important to the food storage facility, which sees approximately 994 million pounds of product

moved through the warehouse annually. The arrival gate on Lewis & Clark Drive will be monitored by the administrative office via security cameras. Proper ID numbers will be required to enter the facility and trucks will be buzzed in. (Cont. page 3)

"Watching kids grow each year in leadership and showmanship skills is really impressive. It takes time and hard work to raise an animal and sell it at the fair. At the end of the fair, the sense of pride the kids have in what they've accomplished is outstanding," says Tolar, sharing what he enjoys the most about working at the fair.

Landscaping the Port

"Make the Port look great - that's our theme."

It's a dream job. Brian LaBeau and Simon Hernandez spend their day outside caring for the Port landscape. It's a much larger assignment than many realize, encompassing not just the Riverfront Center, but all Port properties, including empty lots, property fronts, and visual barriers. A surprisingly small team of four manages the responsibility of keeping the properties looking ship-shape. "We take care of just about anything and everything," LaBeau says of the tasks. "'Make the Port look great.' That's our theme. We see ourselves as marketers for the Port."

Landscaping is more technical than just mowing, removing weeds, and trimming trees. There is a science to proper care and feeding of greenspace. When LaBeau started in spring of 2017, the job ahead presented challenges, although with a degree in Landscape Architecture, he was well-qualified to meet those. He received a helping hand a few months later when Simon Hernandez joined the crew. Hired initially as a sprayer, Hernandez has flourished as part of the team and now assists with much of the mowing, operating the largest of the Port's two mowers, a 72-inch Kabota.

The hard work and applied science has paid off. "We're finally seeing results after two summers," reports LaBeau, "The lawns are staying green all summer long with proper water, nutrition, and the mulching."

The work is constant, and each season presents unique hurdles. However, both LaBeau and Hernandez agree, "We enjoy the freedom and challenge of being out here and having to subdue this property and making it look good. We take pride in what we do. We enjoy when we clean something up and can see the results and other people can enjoy it too."

Benefit Dinner & Auction to support all Morrow County FFA


